Drawing upon artistic, philosophical, religious, social, historical, and political perspectives, this course analyzes core concepts of Ethnic Studies, explores the intersection of race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, religion, class, and ability, emphasizes resistance and liberation, and examines the impact of these communities on the development of the United States.

Modification: Removed Arab American from core competencies listed in course objectives as required by CSU reviewer for articulation.

2.1.3. ETHS 115 Critical Mixed Race Studies (3 units)

Catalog Description Critical Mixed Race Studies provides an interdisciplinary survey of the experiences of multiracial Americans. As the core concepts of Critical Mixed Race Studies are analyzed, this course: explores the intersection of mixed race identity with Native American, African American, Chicana/Latina American, and Asian Pacific Islander American communities in the United States; explores liberatory strategies embraced by multiracial Americans as they relate to gender, sexuality, religion, class, and ability; examines racial formations and representations of Native American, African American, Chicana/Latina American, and Asian Pacific Islander American communities.

Modification: Revised core competencies listed in course objectives to emphasize four historically defined racialized core groups (Native American, African American, Chicana/Latina American, and Asian Pacific Islander American) as required by CSU reviewer for articulation.

2.1.4. ETHS 160 Critical Asian Pacific Islander American Studies: Filipina/x/o American Experience (3 units)

Catalog Description This course provides an interdisciplinary survey of Asian American Pacific Islander and Oceanic artistic, philosophical, religious, social, historical, and political perspectives in the United States from the 1500s to the present. This cour

Catalog Description This course introduces an in-depth analysis and discussion of the nature and significance of various types of physical evidence commonly found at crime scenes. The course combines theoretical concepts associated with the use of physical evidence in the forensic setting with student involvement in the processing of simulated crime scenes.
